Easter 2024 - Ski Trip

The High School Leckhampton embarked on our inaugural Ski Trip during Easter 2024, taking 40 students from Year 8 and Year 9 to the Myrkdalen hotel and ski area in Norway.

We departed on Sunday 24th March, meeting at 4:15am at the High School Leckhampton. We arrived in Bergen following a 2-hour flight in the early afternoon and once our 3-hour transfer had commenced we were able to enjoy some beautiful scenery (with many Fjords) and many tunnels en-route to our fantastic hotel.

From Monday to Friday, our students challenged themselves by learning how to ski on some pristine slopes with plentiful snow. Starting by mastering the basic snow-plough to ensure that they could control their descent downslope, before advancing to basic turning, and stepping into parallel turns. There were a few mishaps on the way, with plenty of falls but all students were able to laugh and brush off the snow before showing resilience and starting again.

By the end of the week our students were able to ride the ski lifts to the top of the mountain and descend safely back to the hotel – no small achievement. For more experienced skiers, there were plenty of options to explore the mountain resort with their guide, with a snow-park allowing for some jumping, off-piste areas and snow-cross runs to get the blood pumping.

An early departure on Saturday 30th March saw the group re-trace their journey and return to the UK, safely with no accidents or injuries.

With excellent food, quick transfers and fantastic snow, this is a trip that will be long-remembered by all and hopefully many more will want to go on future trips. We hope to be able to travel to the same resort at Easter 2025, so keep your eyes open for the launch of the next trip.

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HSL Book of the month - April


This month, we are recommending that our pupils and parents of the HSL community read: You Are Awesome by Matthew Syed.

Ceramics Workshop with a TV Star

The Art & DT department are excited to share the highlights of our recent ceramics workshop at The High School Leckhampton. With over 50 students from Years 7, 8, and 9, along with some enthusiastic staff, we embarked on a creative journey guided by local ceramic artist Dave Short, a finalist on the latest series of the Channel 4 programme The Big Pottery Throw Down.



Our brief was to create a collaborative installation celebrating our local area. Each participant took on a segment of a Leckhampton map, crafting it from terracotta clay under Dave's expert and friendly guidance. It was a hands-on experience, with students and staff rolling, carving, and decorating their pieces with enthusiasm.

The art room buzzed with energy throughout the day as everyone took on the challenge. There were so many great designs and interpretations, no two were the same. Students had the chance to express themselves and respond to their local area, resulting in a cohesive piece that truly reflects our school's vibrant ethos and location.





Currently, our creations are being glazed and fired, so we can prepare the pieces for display somewhere within the school. Mr. Newman is eyeing the installation as a potential addition to the Geography department.

In the next edition of the school magazine, one of our Year 9 students will share their interview with Dave, delving into his ceramic practice, inspirations, and experiences on TV. Make sure you don't miss out on this insightful glimpse into the world of ceramics, celebrity and creativity.



Thank you so much to our fabulous PTFA who have raised and donated some funds to support our Eco-Committee this year. Changemakers Project - Cheltenham Education Partnership

We are taking part in a Changemakers project run by the Cheltenham Education Partnership where each month we meet for an afternoon and discuss ways to make our school better for the environment. Each school taking part has taken one specific idea like air quality or recycling and turned it into a schoolwide project. Once we see the change we have made then we are going to present our ideas and changes to our school at the Cheltenham Science Festival in June. Our Year 7s are going to visiting the Science Festival on the same day.

We have been preparing in our Changemakers sessions since September, coming up with ideas and writing down different topics we can explore as a group. We have chosen to have air quality as our group and school topic. We have been working hard to collect different types of data and facts to present at the Science Festival. We have decided as a group to choose data from our air quality data collector called Monty who stays at the school for a set amount of time and records the air quality during the day. We have lots of data across the weeks from him. We are planning to have Monty at our school again in May for a set amount of time so we can track more data.

We are planning on making an air quality strip which is similar to a temperature strip with different colours for the different air quality. To help us have some higher scores on our air quality strip, we need your help. Do you drive your child to school? Do you need to drive your child to school? If your child must be driven to school that is more than fine. However, if your child is cleverly persuading you to give a lift could you perhaps encourage them to walk, or even drive halfway and get them to walk the rest of the way? This will help then to get into a habit of walking and soon they will want to walk the whole way. If it is essential for you to drive you child, why not organise a car share with others in the same position?

Last week, some of our students took part in a survey talking about how they get to school. We saw that students who walk to school felt happier about it and students who drive to school that could walk felt more inspired to make a change, and walk to school, all students when asked knew and were happy to learn about air quality.

Walk to School Week is back this year, taking place from Monday 20th until Friday 24th May 2024.


The Eco-Committee is requesting that everybody makes the effort this week to walk or cycle to school where possible.
