We were incredibly proud of the Year 7 pupils who attended and were able to show their excellent leadership skills.

Whilst all these enrichment activities have been going on I am pleased to say that our pupils have continued to work hard in the classroom. The Year 8 interim reports suggest that our pupils are really focused, with the vast majority of pupils securing 1 and 1* grades for their effort. Cheltenham Festival of Performing Arts

Over a busy two week period in May, several High School Leckhampton pupils competed at The Cheltenham Festival of Performing Arts. They performed in Dance, Drama and Music, achieving some incredible scores - and winning some of their classes! We are incredibly proud of them for their commitment, dedication and effort.









Geography curriculum beat

Our Key Stage 3 Geography curriculum has been crafted with a simple intent, to inspire in our pupils, a curiosity and fascination about the world and its people that will remain with them for the rest of their lives. We use a thematic approach to ensure that our pupils can see the common threads that unite the study of Geography, with hazards, sustainability, physical landscapes, economies, and development key to understanding the world around them. This is supplemented by the development of key skills which enable our pupils to read and interpret the world.



What have our students been learning?

Year 7 - At the start of Year 7, our students focused on the geography of the United Kingdom, to ensure that their future studies were grounded in knowledge of their local spaces. Following this, they developed their practical geography skills by learning how to read and use maps and geographical information systems. A key theme of geography at High School Leckhampton is learning about natural hazards, so the Year 7s looked at Volcanic hazards and how they impact communities around the world. Introducing the students to core geographical ideas came next by looking at issues around sustainability - where students have been encouraged to evaluate our school's ability to act in an environmentally responsible manner. The natural world will follow this, with an introduction to river landforms and uses. Students have learnt key concepts in each of the geography topics whilst beginning to develop their mathematical, analytical and fieldwork skills, using the local environment for the latter.

Year 8 - At the start of Year 8, our students focused on the geography of Europe, to ensure that their future studies were grounded in knowledge of their continent (expanding the scale from the 1st topic of Year 7). Following this, they investigated natural environments and human impacts on Rainforests and Deserts. Continuing the key theme of natural hazards, the Year 8s looked at Earthquake hazards and how they impact communities around the world. Introducing the students to core geographical ideas was next by looking at issues around Development (Poverty and Wealth) – where students have been encouraged to evaluate the UK's relative wealth in comparison with other countries. The natural world theme will be revisited as we approach the end of the year, with an introduction to coastal landforms and management, this continues our theme around natural landscapes starting in Y7 with Rivers. Students have continued to embed the key concepts in each of the geography topics and develop their use of mathematical, analytical and fieldwork skills, using an urban environment (Bristol) for the latter.

Geography Geography

Fantastic examples of work:

Our Year 7 pupils have recently been investigating sustainability at the High School and collected data about the environmental impact of the school. They were encouraged to present their findings using infographics, and then analysed their work to either agree or disagree with the following hypothesis. "High School Leckhampton is a sustainable school".



Our Year 8 pupils have recently completed a decision-making task, where they were presented with 6 options to dramatically improve the Democratic Republic of Congo. They had \$1billion to spend on an infrastructural project to raise the living standards of residents. Having evaluated each project for their relative strengths and weaknesses, students had to create a campaign to justify their opinions to a wider audience.

Geography Field Trip

On a recent visit to Bristol, Year 8 Geographers were given an opportunity to develop their field working skills by collecting information about the regeneration of Bristol's Princes Wharf area. A former docking area up to 1975, Bristol's floating harbour was too shallow to accommodate large container ships and therefore fell into disuse and disrepair throughout the 1980s/1990s. To increase footfall in the area much has been done, including the opening of the M-Shed Museum, cafes, restaurants, shopping facilities and the famous SS Great Britain.

Students were placed into small groups and given time to investigate the wharf by collecting pedestrian counts, traffic surveys, environmental quality assessments and land use surveys. The most popular technique used was the questionnaires, which required students to ask a range of questions to members of the public.

This visit has helped expose our students to the demands of fieldwork by increasing their range of skills. This will ultimately prove useful in preparing our students for their GCSE in Geography as well as encouraging them to read landscapes carefully and apply ideas to the world around them.







Maths Challenge Winners

Our budding mathematicians sat the UK Mathematics Trust Junior Maths Challenge on the 26th April and have been waiting with bated breath for the results! The questions in the challenges are tricky and designed to make the students think. The students represented the school remarkably well and their participation and engagement with the challenging puzzles was exemplary.

This week the results arrived, and a tea party was held to celebrate the achievements of the students. With many students achieving the Bronze and Silver awards we had a single Gold achiever. The Best in Year 7 award went to Oscar Bruce (7WI) and the Best In School award went to Ollie Freebry (8IS). Congratulations to all the students and in particular our 'Best' winners!











Eco - Commitee Update

Thank you to everyone who made the effort to walk or cycle to and from school during Walk To School Week from Monday 15th - Friday 19th May. To assess the impact of this week, the Eco-Committee have been monitoring the number of cars entering the car park at the start and the end of each day. We plan to carry out these measurements each year to track the growth of these trees as we also increase in size.
