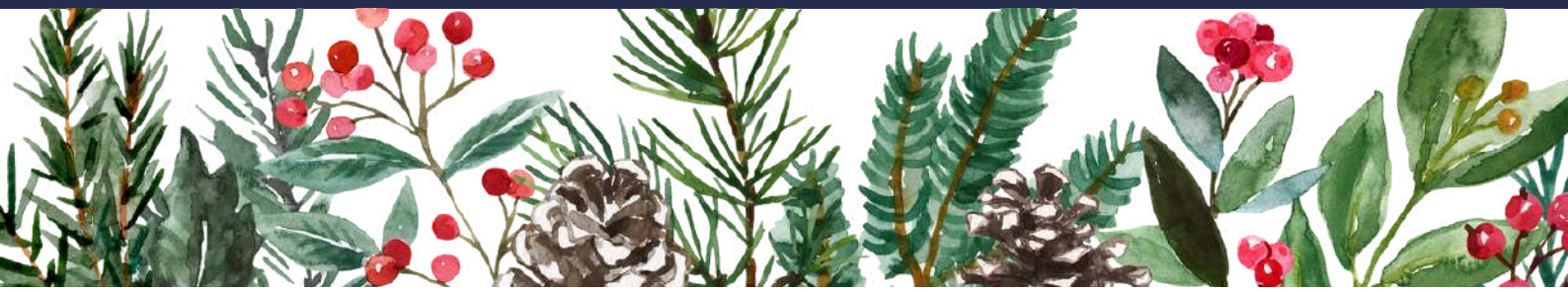

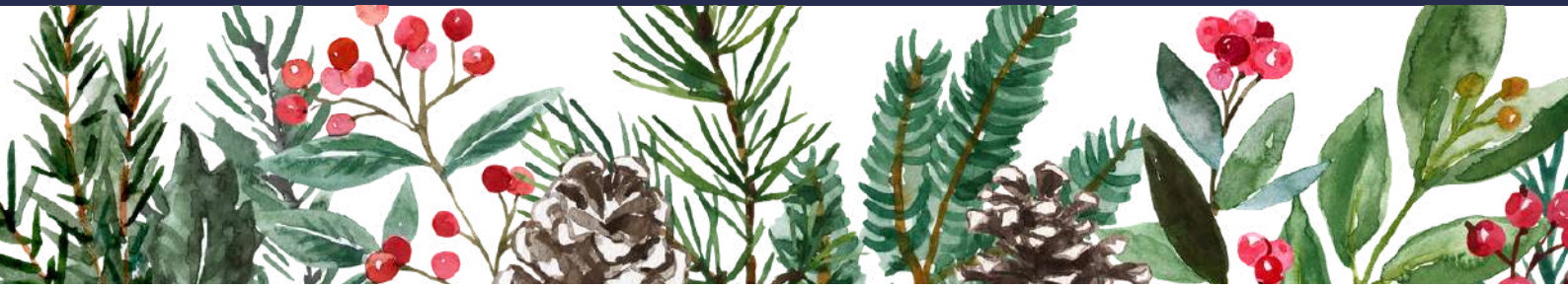

House News: House pride shines bright at HSL!

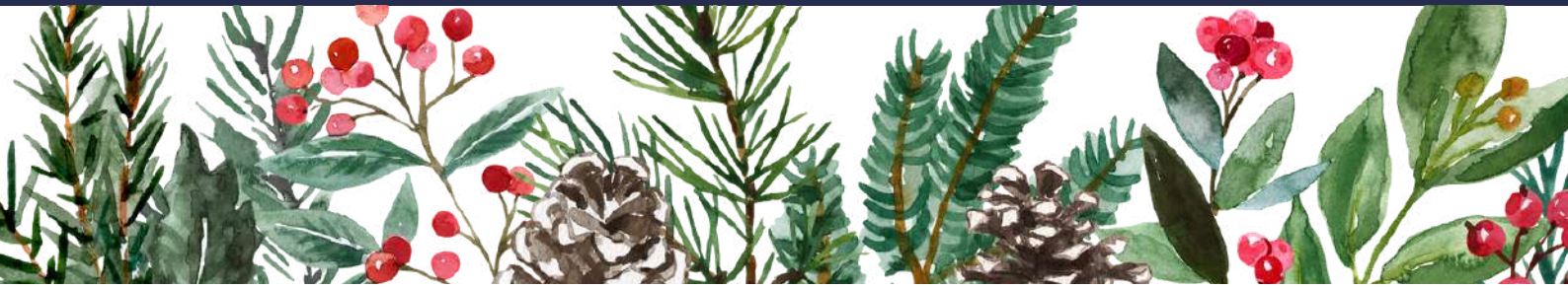

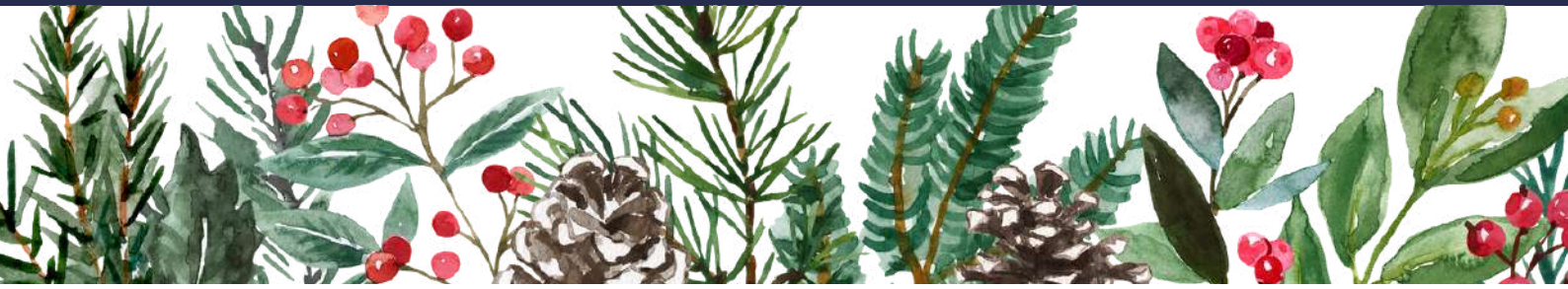

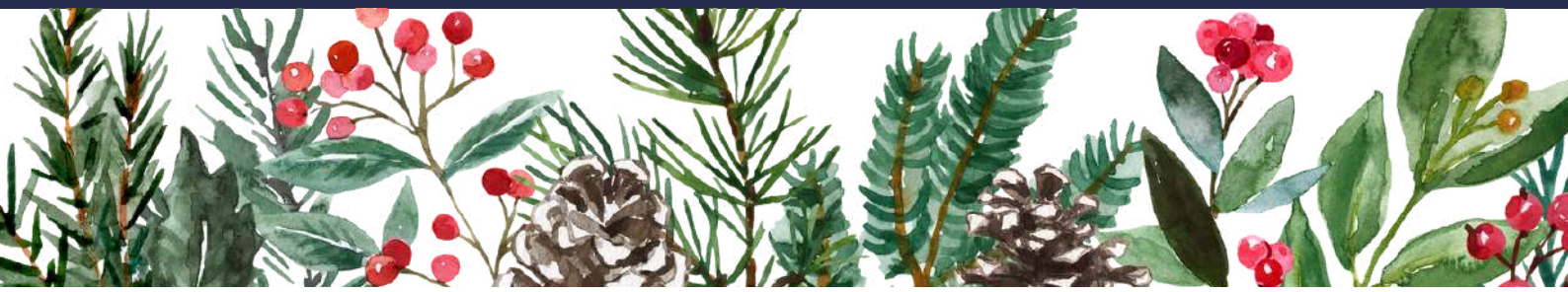

It was truly a delight to welcome in members of the local community into our school; building our relationships with those around us and really being 'a flagship school at the heart of the community'.





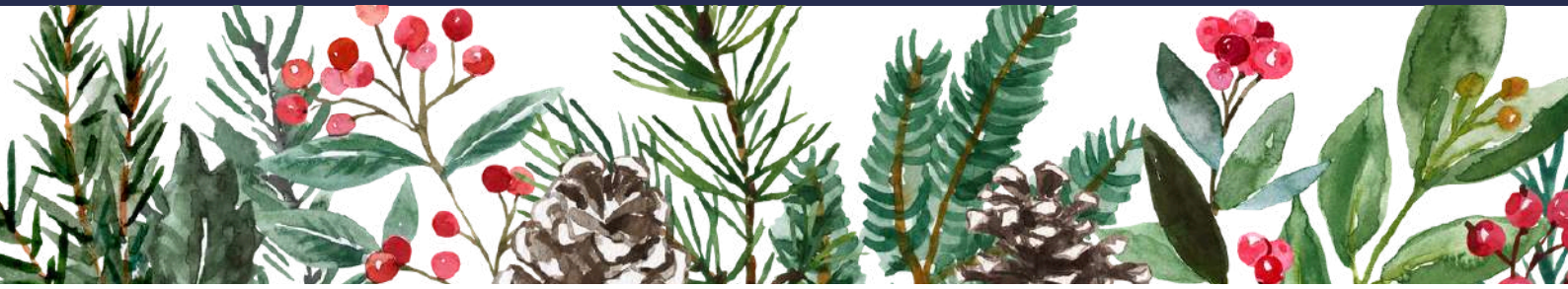

The event was a beautiful reminder of the school's vibrant community spirit and the joy of coming together to celebrate the season.

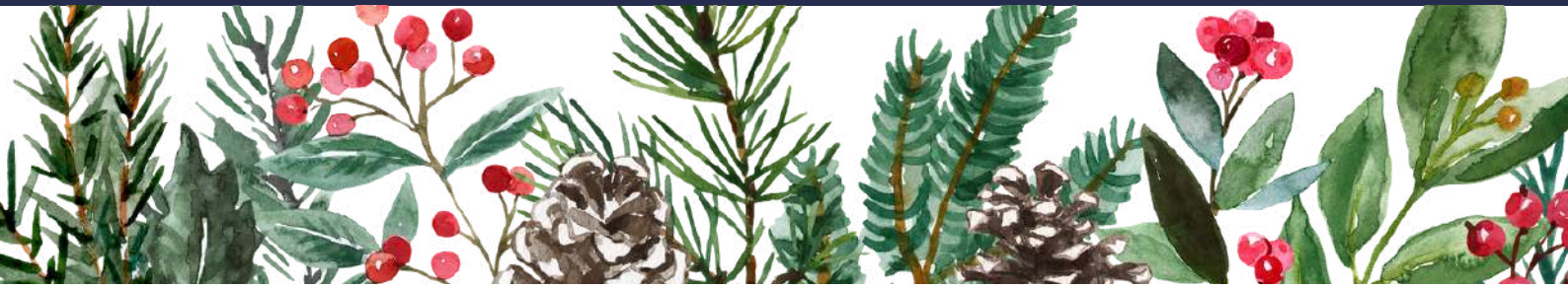

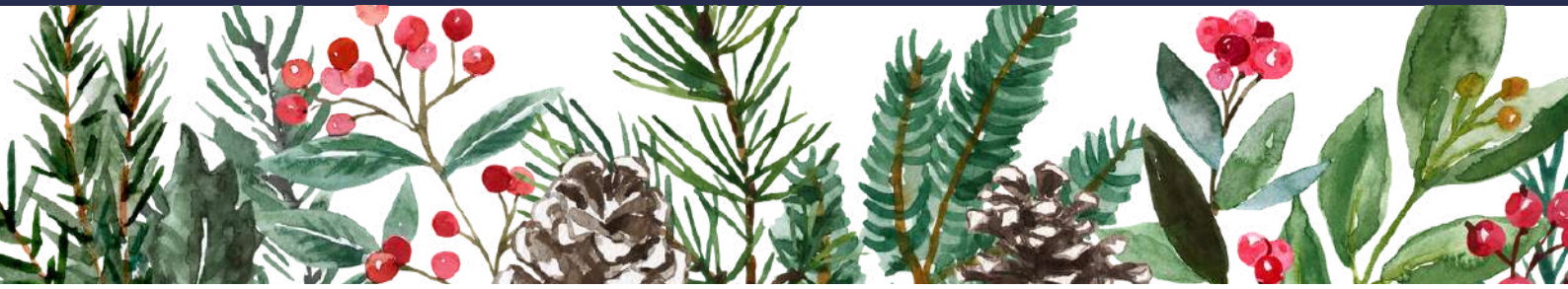

Textile Trip: Workshop with Artist Liske Johnson

Earlier this month, twelve GCSE Art & Textiles pupils had the opportunity to travel to Bromsgrove to work with artist Liske Johnson at her studio, Little Heath Barn Studio. This trip was part of their coursework unit, where students are currently exploring a range of techniques, with a focus on printmaking and dying techniques.

During the workshop, pupils learned the technique of breakdown printing, which involves using silk screens and thickened dyes to create images that progressively "break down" with each pull of the screen. This unique technique produces an impressive effect, allowing the image to shift and transform, creating textures and patterns that evolve over time. Pupils were able to experiment with this process, creating a range of fabrics that will be integral to their coursework in the weeks ahead.

Working with Liske, a professional artist, gave pupils the chance to gain practical experience and insight into the working methods of someone in the field. They were able to ask questions, get hands-on experience with the technique, and see how printmaking is applied in a real studio setting.

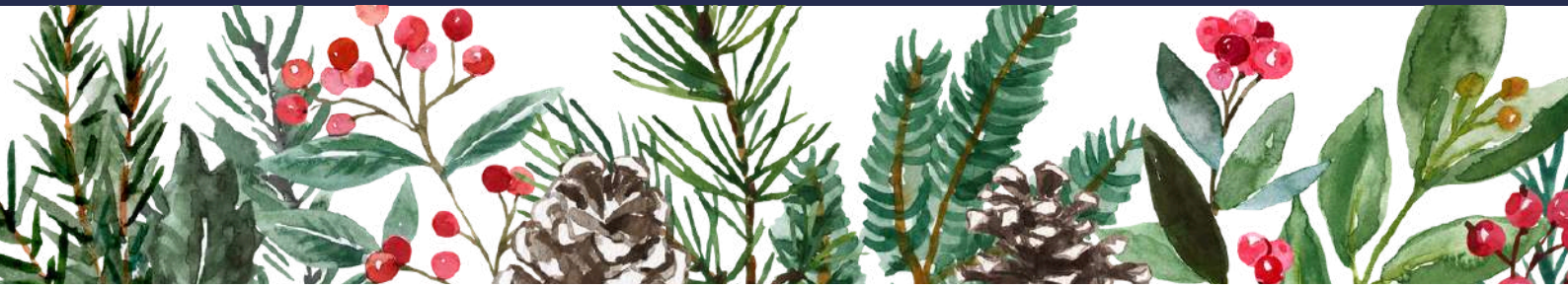
Our students were engaged and thoroughly enjoyed experimenting with the process. The fabrics they created will be valuable for their future work, and we are excited to see how they incorporate these new techniques into their coursework. Textile Trip: Workshop with Artist Liske Johnson





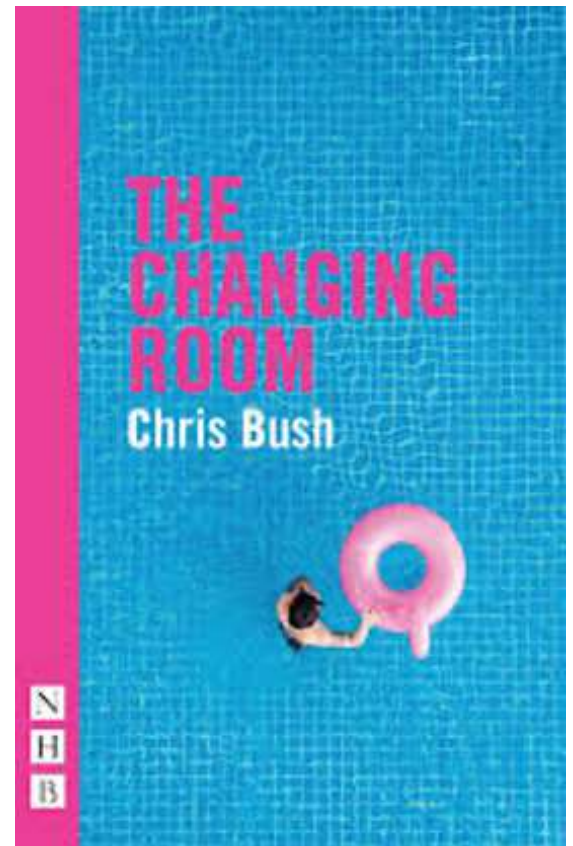
GCSE Drama Showcase

Clear, confident and convincing performances. A complicated text that they handled well. Hard to pick out anyone. It felt they had built up real trust in each other.

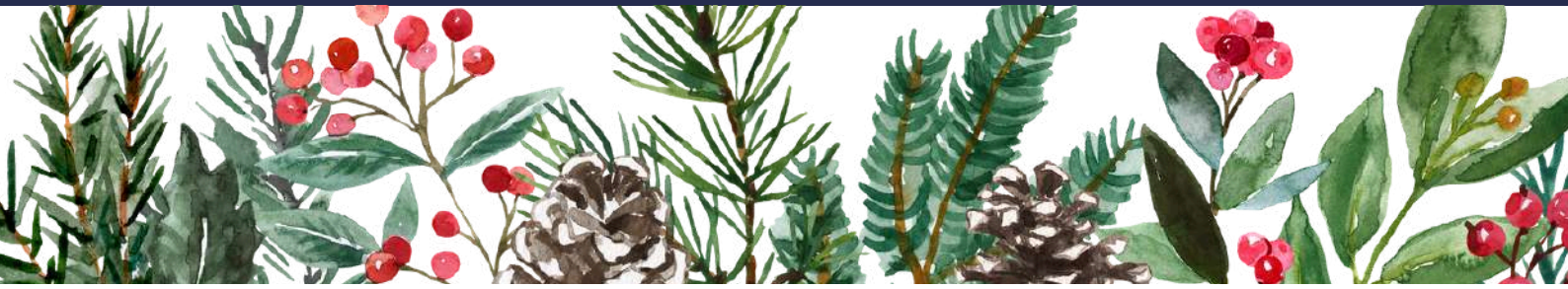

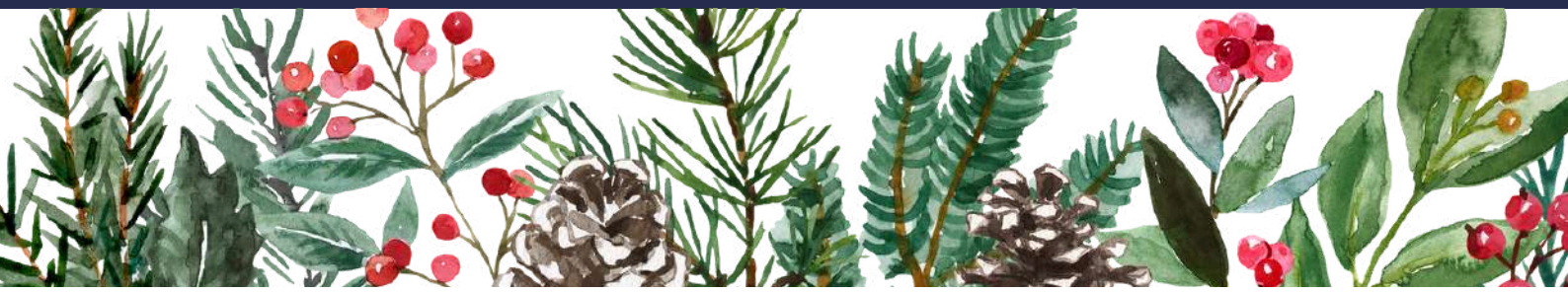

Three students from the Steering Group helped deliver the items, which will help support members of our community who are finding this time of year challenging.

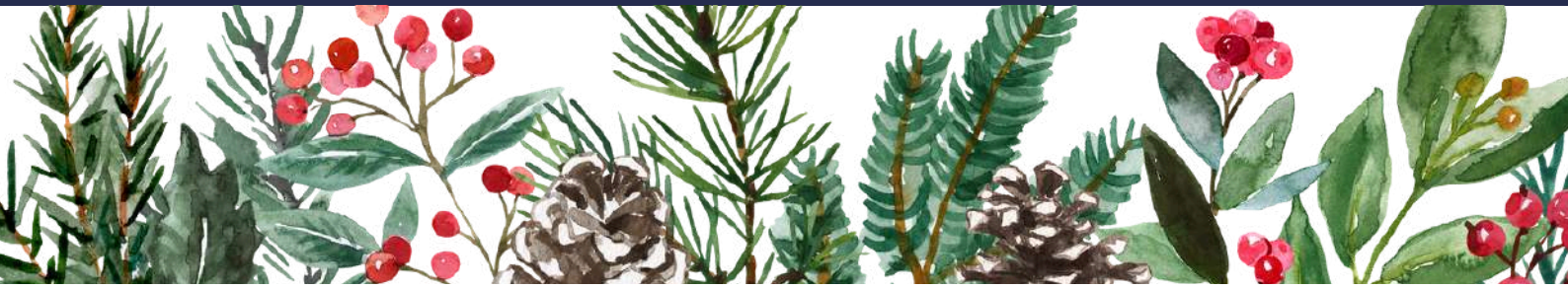

RRSA Rights Round Up

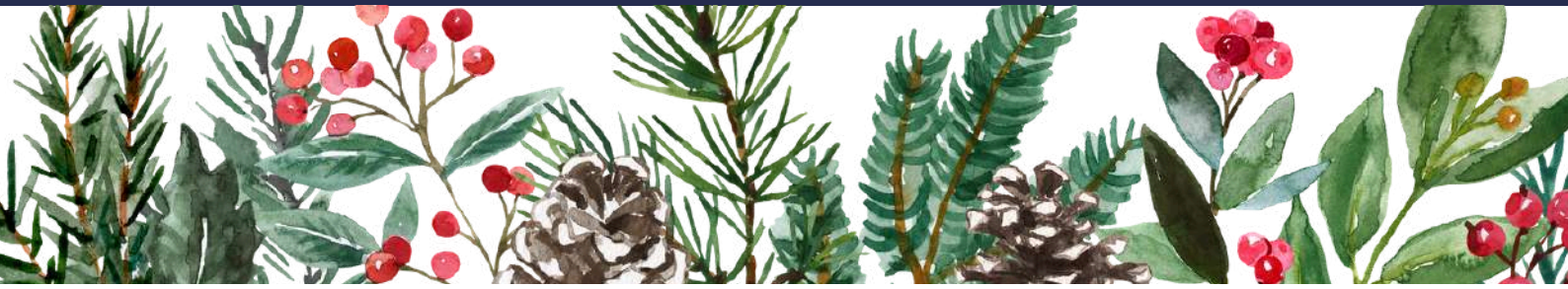
Congratulations to Flo Scott and friends, who have raised £46.40 for WaterAid, our school's global charity for this academic year.

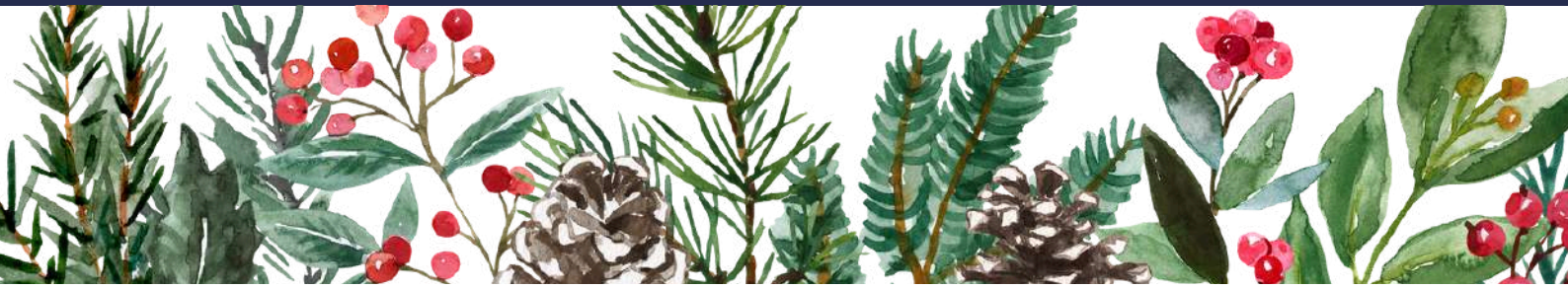
HSL Races to Empower

The event aimed to educate and inspire students about the world of cybersecurity and technology, showcase the companies driving the sector, and introduce a diverse range of professionals working within the industry. Ultimately, it sought to ignite students' interest in pursuing careers in this exciting field.

Our HSL students excelled during the event, showcasing their logical thinking and teamwork to solve a variety of puzzles and challenges.





Science trip to IET Faraday Challenge

On Wednesday 11th December, we travelled to Chosen Hill school to participate in the Faraday challenge. The Faraday challenge is an annual engineering competition for Year 8, which helped to enhance our teamworking skills and creativity by challenging us to design and build a prototype of an invention. This invention had to be one of three things: an educational toy for children, something to help people with disabilities, or something to help athletes and sports players.

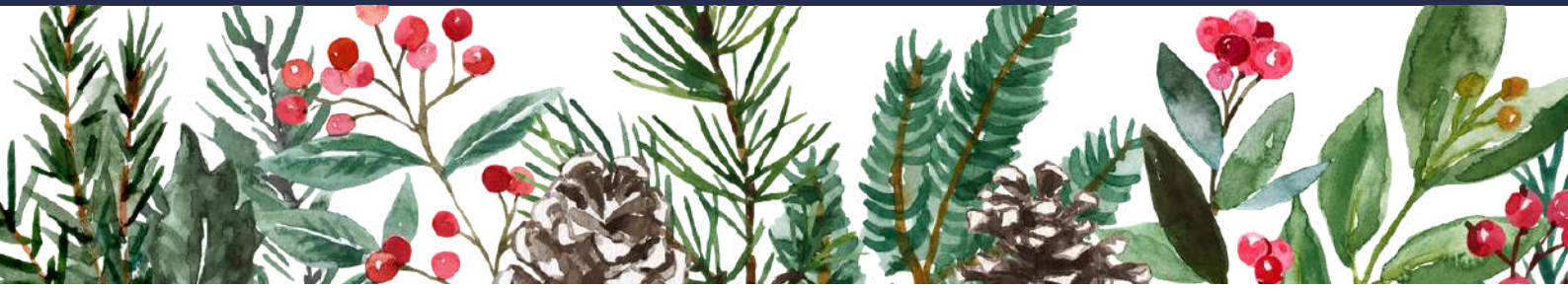
Our school had two teams of six, and we both chose to design an invention to help disabled people. Team five's invention aimed to allow wheelchairs to travel on stairs, and team six's invention aimed to alert a visually impaired person when something was in their way. We had to assign each team member a role, and work well together to come up with ideas, buy the equipment we needed, build circuits to make our prototype work, find problems, and come up with solutions.

At the end of the day, we had to present our ideas, designs, and prototype to the judges and explain how the real invention would function. The judges decided and presented the winning team with the Faraday challenge trophy- our team won with our idea of how to help a visually impaired person. I really enjoyed the day, and am glad I had this opportunity.

The day started off at the community entrance where all the people coming met up at 08:40. Soon we left in the minibus (Thank you Mr Champion) heading for the Chosen Hill School. Once we got there, we entered a big hall. They explained the challenge; you must design a prototype that can help society today. The options were: something to help disabled people, something to help within sport, or a toy for a 2-5 years old child. There were 6 groups in total, 4 were Chosen Hill students and 2 were High School Leckhampton students. The 2 High School Leckhampton groups choose to do something to help disabled people. We all worked hard for the entire day with a few breaks in between and finally it was time to present what we had finished - or not finished since it was a timed event! A group from our school ended up winning with the great Idea of putting a sensor on a shoe so if you are blind and cannot see if the sensor detects something in front of you it will make a noise to warn you. After winning we packed up and left on the minibus (Thank you Mr Champion) and went back to The High School Leckhampton! Thank you Mr Taylor for taking us on this amazing trip.

The IET Faraday challenge day was such an invigorating experience which provided us with lots of new information about engineering and problem solving while also getting to make our own prototypes in two teams.

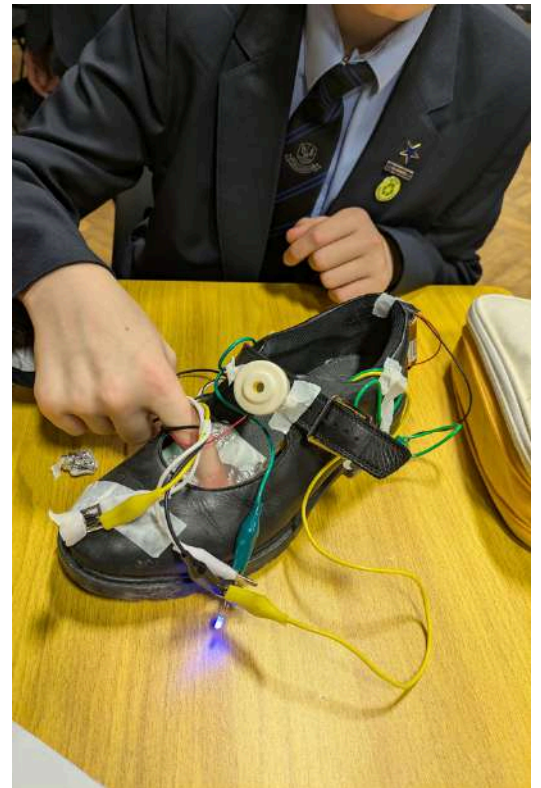

We have reported our results to Eco-Schools who have entered us into a draw to win Eco prizes.

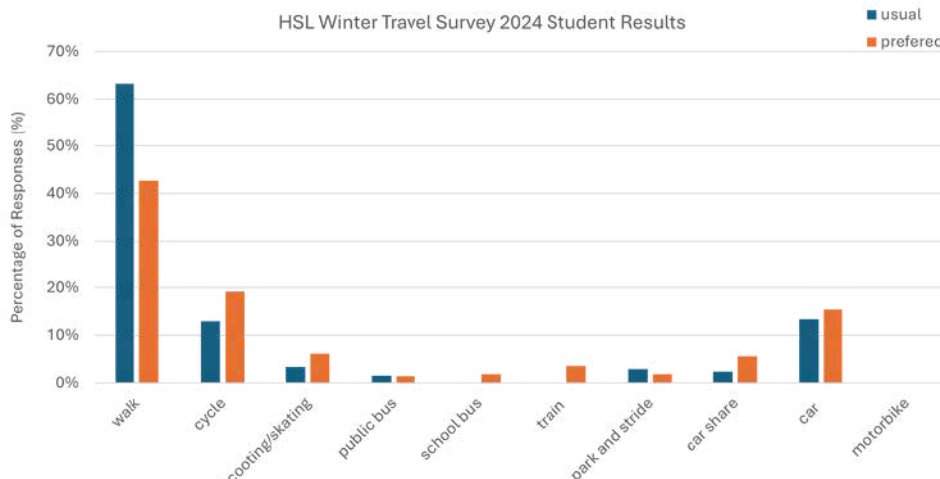


Winter Travel Survey 2024 Results

Science Update

Severn Trent Science of Sewage session

On Thursday 28th November, Rob Jansen from Severn Trent Water visited The High School Leckhampton to deliver an informative and interactive session on the Science of Sewage to our Year 7 students.

The session covered how the company treat the water coming out of our taps so that it is safe to drink, and how they treat the sewage they receive so the water is safe to go back into our rivers.

Students learned about what should and shouldn't go in our sewers and the impact this can have on households, water treatment costs, and the environment.

Towards the end of the session, our students pledged to look after their environment by following the guidance given to protect our sewers and we have received a commitment certificate in recognition of this.

Students now have a better appreciation of the time and effort that goes into providing us with clean water to drink and the link between this session, the work our Eco-Committee do, and the UNCRC Article 24: Health, Water, Food and Environment. Thank you for Rob for running this session for our students.

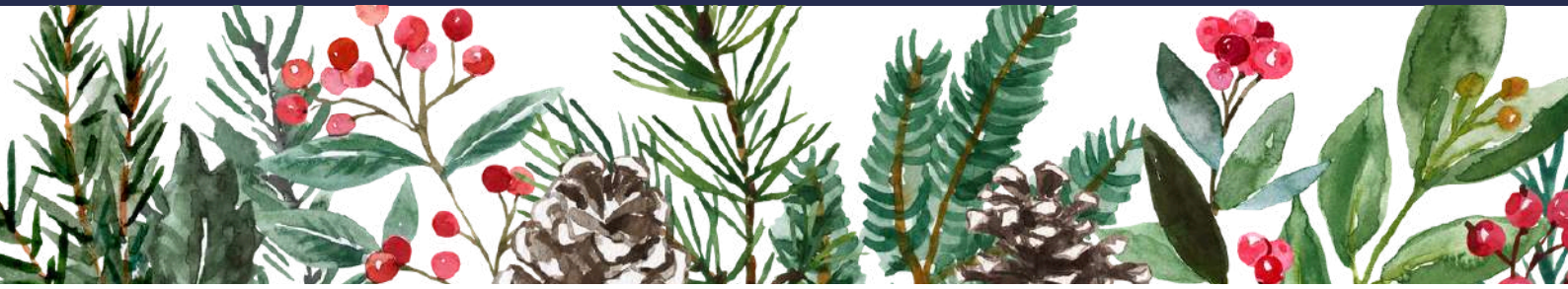

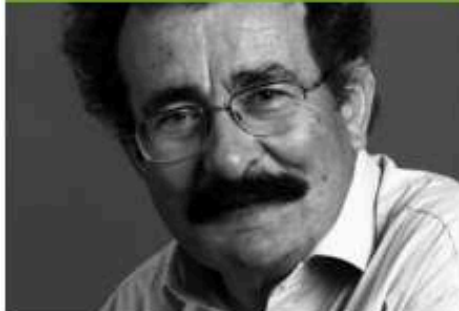

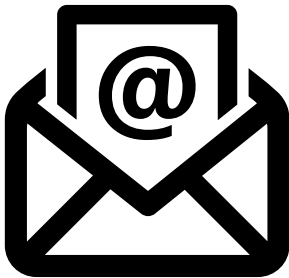
