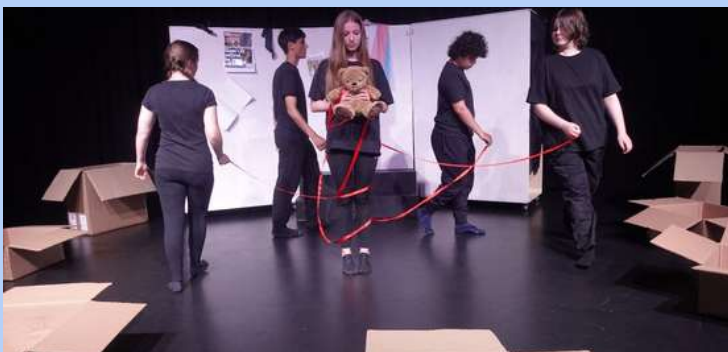
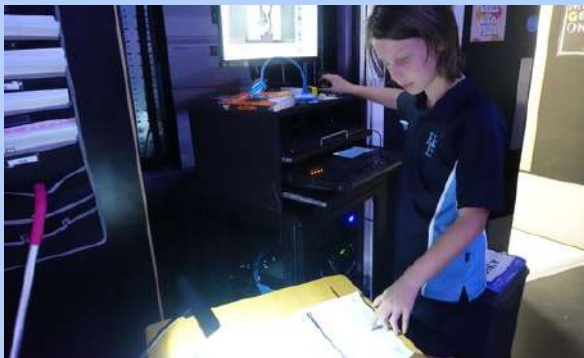

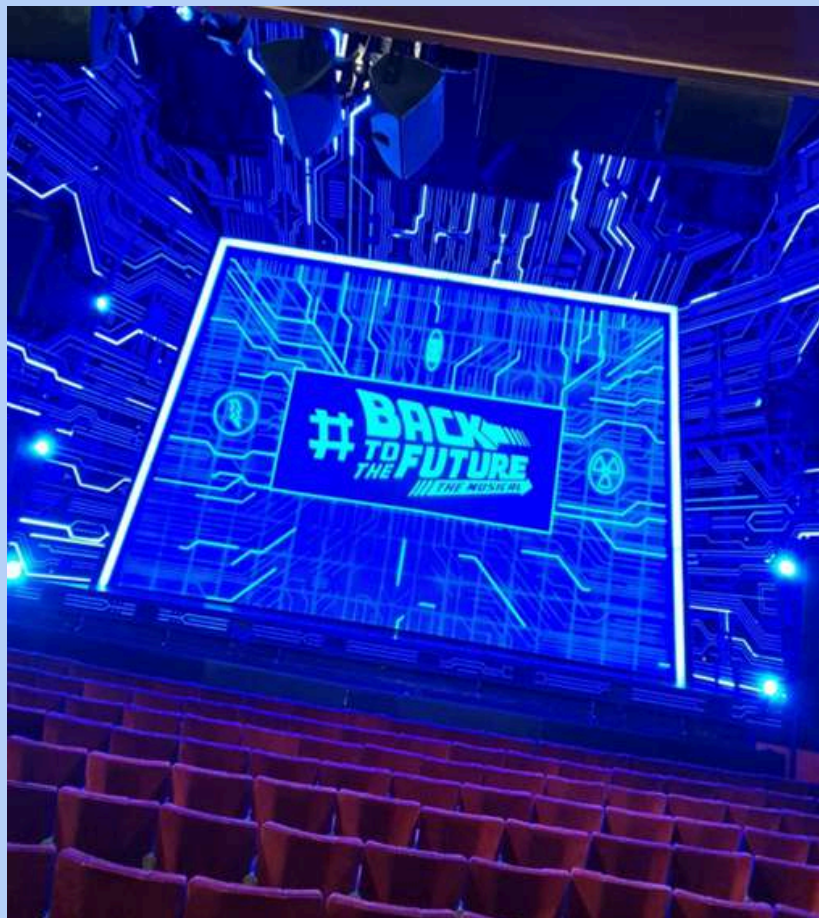
Our GCSE Drama students have been gearing up for their first practical exam of their devised pieces. Created entirely from scratch and based on different stimuli, the students have created moving, thought-provoking and incredibly powerful theatre about topics they think are important to raise awareness about. Subject Spotlight: R P E

The Religious Education department will be 'renamed' in September 2025 to the 'Philosophy, Beliefs and Ethics' department to reflect more accurately what we teach/ study. The Religious Education Council and the previous Agreed Syllabus have both nurtured a 'world views' approach to RE - recognising that we explore different religious and non-religious world views and the variety found within. This is an exciting time for the department and students will therefore have PBE on their timetable instead of RE.



In April the GCSE RE students went to two local churches to explore and investigate their eco credentials. This was part of HSL's co enrichment day. Both St Peter's and Pip and Jims have 'Eco Church' awards which means they have made a concerted effort to be more environmentally friendly in their land use, building management, the way they work in the community, their global links and in their worship. Our students were engaged and asked pertinent questions at both locations. Feedback was incredibly positive and evidence then enrichment activities such as these are invaluable to our students' learning.



In June respected artist Razwan ul Haq came into HSL to work with the Year 7 and Year 10 RE students. Razwan has had his artwork on display internationally and uses excerpts from the Quran and Allah's 99 names to create images like cars, people, and even items like a bicycle which was created on a hill for the Tour de France. 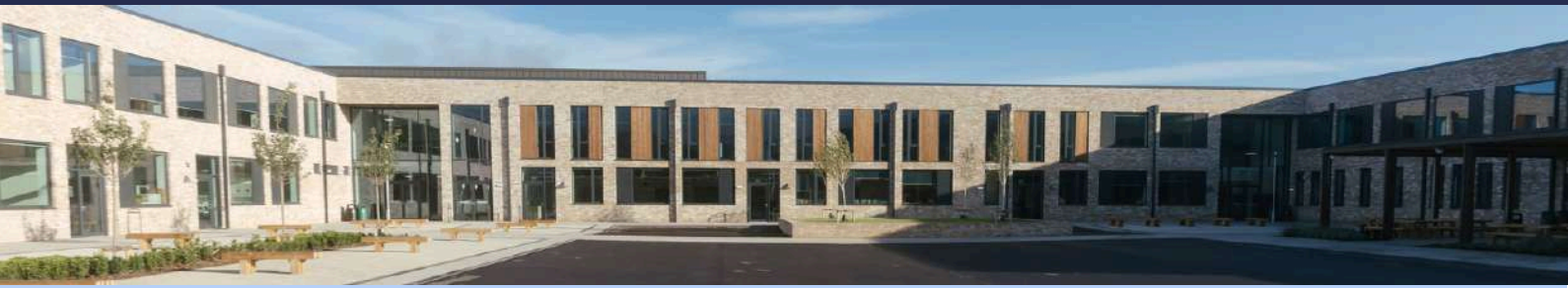

CEP ChangeMakers at the Wilson Gallery: Wednesday 25th June 2025

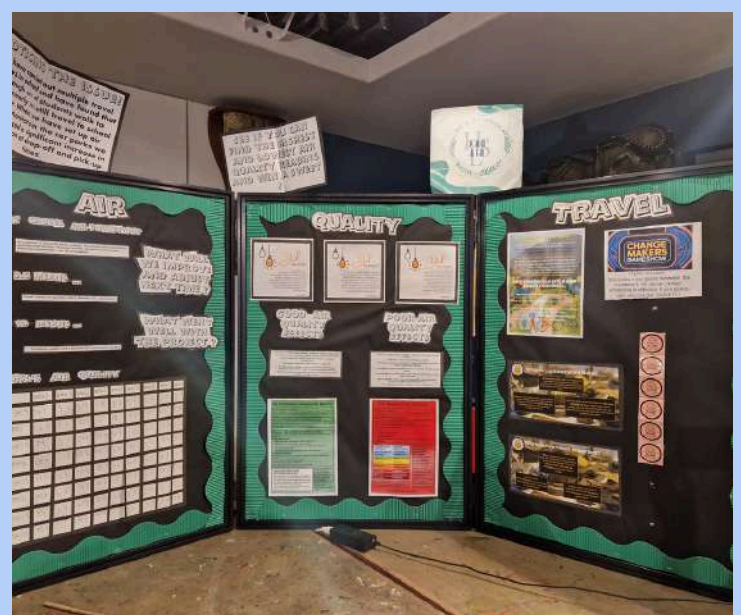
This year, four Year 10 students (Elijah Callaghan, Constance Grant, Henry Taylor and Justin Collier) and three Year 9 students (Jacob Freer, Molly Hannaford-George and Charlotte Deacon) have been taking part in the Cheltenham Education Partnership's (CEP) ChangeMakers program.

Together they have attended 5 workshops across this academic year which supported them in planning, carrying out, and evaluating their own environmental project in school linked to Air Quality and Active Travel.

Our ChangeMakers were given the opportunity to present the results of their project to members of the public at the Wilson Gallery (51 Clarence St, Cheltenham GL50 3JT) on Wednesday 25th June.

They created an impressive display complete with interactive elements and spoke confidently to the public about their environmental work, including the Mayor of Cheltenham, Councillor Dr David Willingham!

Active Travel Ambassadors Scheme

Did you know that 1 in 5 journeys to HSL are currently made by car? As an Eco-School this is something we would like to change - we would like all our students, staff and visitors to choose to walk, cycle or scoot to school where at all possible. It's good for the environment, good for the local air quality and good for the local community to have fewer cars on the roads.

That is why 8 members of our Eco-Committee have this year been taking part in the 'Active Travel Ambassadors Scheme'. A few months ago they went to Gloucester Shire Hall where they had to give a presentation in front of individuals from the council and other organisations, where they successfully bid for £200 to encourage active travel at HSL.

With the money the students have been running 'Lockhampton Gold' - a scheme where once or twice a week a random bike in the bike sheds has a 'golden lock' put on it, and the owner of the bike wins a free lunch at the school. We are hoping this scheme will encourage and reward students and staff to cycle to school. 'Lockhampton Gold' will continue up to Christmas which will allow us to roll it out to the new Y7s, and also reward people for cycling in the colder weather.

While most of the funding will be spend on Lockhampton Gold, we also bid for a nominal £1 for postage to write to Vistry Homes. Vistry Homes are the owners of Lott's Meadow - the field between Burrow's Field and Kidnapper's Lane. Lott's Meadow is the missing link in a safe route to school for students living in Leckhampton and beyond. While Burrow's has a gravel cycle track across it, Lott's Meadow has three major barriers to cycling: the kissing gates on either side, the extreme muddiness for half of the year, and the lack of designation as a bridleway (it is only a public footpath). The field is designated green space in the local plan, but it is owned by a housing developer - Vistry Homes. The Eco-Committee have written to Vistry Homes to ask them to consider removing the gates and adding a hard surface. We have also presented to various councillors and council staff asking for the same thing. The alternative route to school is using Church Road, but this is very congested and does not provide a good cycling or walking environment. If we were able to make Lott's Meadow accessible to active travel it would provide a much safer, and more pleasant, route to school for a lot of our students.

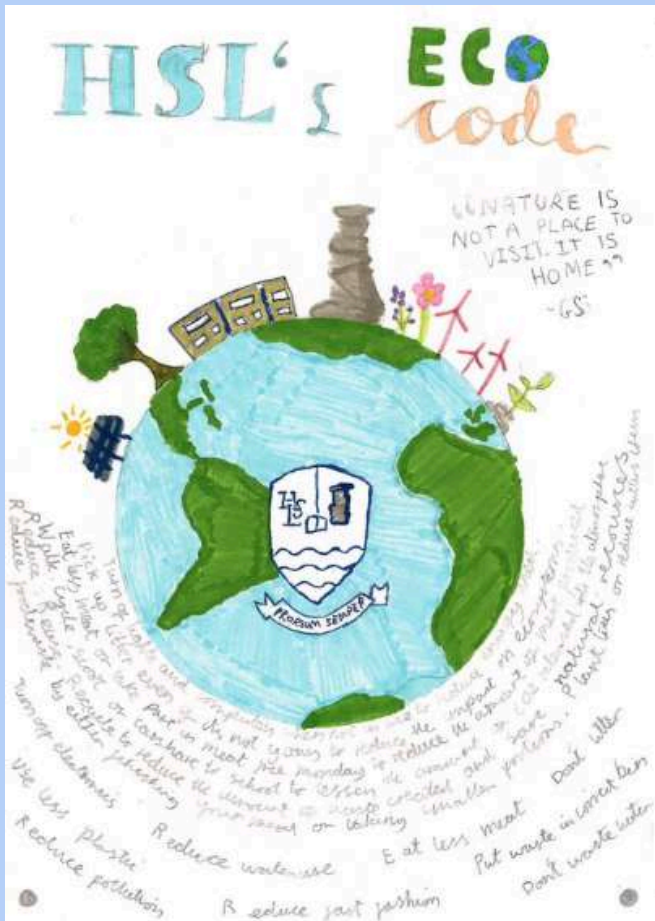


HSL Eco-Code 2025

We are proud to present HSL's new Eco-Code for next academic year, designed by Beatrice Barber and Lauren Dege both in 9CH.

Creating an Eco-Code, a mission statement that acts as a call to action for all, is the seventh and final step of our application process for the Eco-Schools Green Flag: this is an accreditation that acknowledges, rewards and celebrates the ecological achievements of young people.

We are nearly ready to submit our application to renew our Eco-Schools Green Flag accreditation for this academic year and will let you know in September whether we have been successful!

Although the school term may be coming to an end, our work as an Eco-School is never done. To help our entire community continue to protect our planet over the summer break please see below for 10 small actions you can do today with family and friends. Please let us know what you get up to over the holidays to reduce your personal carbon footprint.

5 Save energy at home.
There are a variety of simple changes you can make to counter climate change at home, from switching off lights when you leave a room, to not overfilling the kettle when making a brew. Why not Google 'Energy saving tips' and create an energy-saving plan for your family?

6 Litter-pick.
Next time you go for a walk, grab a litter-picker and get picking! This simple action is a great way to make an immediate difference and is a perfect excuse to spend more time outdoors.

7 Swap out a single-use plastic.
Most plastic is made from fossil fuels and plastic pollution is a global problem. Identify plastics in your home that could easily be replaced with a more sustainable alternative. For example, swap shower gel with a bar of soap, or clingfilm with containers/reusable wax wraps.

8 Buy something second-hand.
Next time you need a new book, item of clothing, or anything else, check whether you can buy it second-hand. Websites like Vinted have a young person's section that sells toys, clothes, and even fancy-dress outfits. Less production means less greenhouse gases!

9 Contact your MP.
Many of us feel like our leaders aren't taking climate change seriously enough. An MP's role is to represent our interests and concerns to parliament. Write to your MP, share your worries and hopefully this will encourage them to champion environmental policies.

10 Calculate your carbon footprint.
Schools can understand their carbon footprint using our free calculator, Count Your Carbon. For individuals, the WWF have a brilliant, free carbon footprint calculator. Complete the questionnaire to get an understanding of your carbon footprint, then take action to bring it down.
